This list is a starting point for summer reading ideas. Parents are encouraged to preview all reading materials prior to their child experiencing the text.


Caddie Lawn




The Year of Billy Miller


Where the Mountain Meets the Moon




The Borrowers

The Great Gilly Hopkins


