

School Overview, Mission, and Philosophy

Founded in 2001, Providence Academy is an independent, Catholic, co-educational college preparatory school serving students in Pre-K through Grade 12. All divisions share a 300,000 square foot Georgian colonial school building. The 42-acre campus is 11 miles northwest of downtown Minneapolis in the suburban city of Plymouth.

From the heart of our motto, “Faith, Knowledge, Virtue,” Providence Academy aims to develop habits of spirit, mind, and action to prepare students for future leadership in vocations and civic life. The faith and morals taught by the Catholic Church provide the foundation for time-honored training in the liberal arts and sciences. The curriculum’s rigor instills customs of discipline and assures both breadth and depth in students’ mastery of core knowledge that is the foundation for higher learning. Our mission is to educate clear thinkers, informed believers, and good citizens prepared to meet the challenges of American life in the 21st century.

The facilities and program reflect a threefold emphasis in academics, arts, and athletics. Learning spaces include modern classrooms, fully equipped science laboratories and computing labs, a metal and wood shop, a museum-quality Antiquities Gallery, and well-appointed spaces for the performing and visual arts. A 650-seat, professional-quality performing arts center opened in 2017 and renovations to outdoor athletic venues, including a 1,500-seat artificial turf stadium convertible to a seasonal dome, were completed in 2016.

Accreditation

Providence Academy received re-accreditation from the Independent Schools Association of the Central States (ISACS) in 2018.

Student Conduct & Disclosure Policy

Any student on track to graduate in good standing receives the endorsement of the administration of Providence Academy. PA reports appropriate records that colleges may request. This includes academic transcripts, teacher referrals, and disciplinary records including any suspension that exceeds one day, and expulsion. PA expects students to disclose their disciplinary history when it is required of them in the college enrollment process. Following graduation, PA sends a final report to the college to which a student has enrolled, including a final transcript, as well as any change in standing which supersedes previous responses on school forms.

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Upper School Curriculum

Providence Academy utilizes an independently designed curriculum. Students share core courses in English, History, and Religion in common for all four years, assuring a solid formation and shared engagement with ideas and texts. Beginning in the 2017-18 academic year, the Upper School implemented Quo Vadis-Pathways toward Graduation. Under Quo Vadis, students have the opportunity to choose between college preparatory and honors pathways in all disciplines, allowing them to customize a program to suit their individual talents, abilities, and interests.

- Honors courses are currently offered in Mathematics, Sciences, World Language, Fine and Performing Arts, as well as in core courses in English, History and Religion (*the curriculum chart on the facing page indicates only those course offerings which were available to the Class of 2021, not all present offerings*)
- Utilizing an “embedded honors” approach, courses in English, Religion, History, Spanish and French include students at both the honors and college preparatory levels in the same classroom
- Students must complete two years of world language in Upper School, completing level 3 in one world language or level 2 in two different world languages
- Honors course placements are application-based and determined by the academic department chairs
- Advance College Credit (ACC) courses are offered through the University of Minnesota and Benedictine College. Courses noted with “ACC” on the transcript are equivalent to honors or advanced level courses
- Students have the opportunity to graduate with Latin Honors, qualifying on the basis of cumulative GPA, credit total, and rigor of curriculum

Curriculum Notes & Distinctive Programs

Advanced Placement - In keeping with the independent and intentional nature of our curriculum design, Providence Academy does not seek College Board’s Advanced Placement (AP) designation for any advanced or senior level courses. At the same time, PA faculty support students enrolled in upper level English, History, Math, Physics, Art, and World Language courses in preparing for the corresponding AP exams.

Religion - Required all four years and demanding scholarly engagement with Scripture and primary source texts in literature, philosophy and theology, Religion courses feature the same rigor as other core disciplines. Authors studied in Religion courses include Aquinas, Aristotle, Augustine, A. Bloom, Boethius, Gandhi, Garrigou-Lagrange, Martin Luther King, and Tolstoy.

Soil Application Research Project (SARP) - SARP students contribute to a professional scientific research project by engaging in experimental design, implementation, data collection and analysis, and the preparation of high quality written summaries of findings. Students participate during the summers, as a club involvement, and/or by enrolling in Advanced Biology or Environmental Science Research.

Robotics and Engineering - Students can deepen the skills learned in math and science through participation in FIRST Robotics. Veteran robotics members also lead the middle school’s FIRST Tech Challenge team. Two full-year Engineering electives introduce students to design thinking, programming, and a fully equipped metal shop.

Visual Art - While pursued as electives, PA’s visual art courses provide intensive training in drawing techniques and the sophisticated development of ideas in all artistic media. Seniors taking Studio Art Honors are required to create a portfolio of quality and breadth and to register for the AP Drawing or Art and Design exams.

Performing Arts - Students in the music and theater programs may enroll in their arts courses at the honors level based on audition, expanded participation, and success at MSHSL contests. The audition-based Chamber Choir is among a small number of school choirs selected to perform at the annual conventions of both the American Choral Directors North Central/Central Division and the Minnesota Music Educators Association.

Note 1: The standard science sequence begins with Chemistry in Grade 9. Alternative sequences are possible based on year of PA entry and student scheduling needs. Students may complete Introductory Earth Science in Grade 9 if their mathematics placement requires a delay before enrolling in Chemistry.

Note 2: Latin Poetry and Latin Prose are distinct courses in content and rigor from Latin Poetry ACC and Latin Prose ACC. Students who complete Latin Poetry or Prose and later enroll in the similarly named Advance College Credit course do not repeat any work.

COVID-19 Impacts Statement

The 2020-2021 academic year began with in-person instruction for all students, with a “simul” learning option for students on quarantine. Any student on simul could join all classes remotely and engage with the teacher and class via a required camera and microphone. Major assessments were conducted on-site with special room and spacing accommodations. After Thanksgiving, an on-campus “hybrid” model began that lasted through the end of the year. All Upper School students not on simul were assigned to designated spaces elsewhere in the building to attend, remotely, about two classes per week. Each student’s remote classes changed every two weeks so as to maximize attendance in the classroom.
